# Inauguration of Sept-Îles' First Community Living Environment for Indigenous Students

**Sept-Îles, January 29, 2024** – The Société immobilière du Regroupement des centres d'amitié autochtones du Québec (SIRCAAQ) is proud to officially launch NUTSHIMIT, the very first community living environment dedicated to Indigenous students. This social housing model offers an adapted and culturally safe community environment that promotes access to education and helps young Indigenous students from communities in Côte-Nord and throughout Quebec stay in school.

More than just student dorms, the 32 housing units offer a range of on-site services, community facilities, collaborative workspaces for students and outdoor amenities that all blend into an architectural concept of a fully integrated cultural space.

The living environment is the result of an inclusive process of collaboration with local Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities, current and potential Indigenous students, the governments of Quebec and Canada, and many regional partners, particularly the Cégep and the Ville de Sept-Îles.

# A project designed by and for Indigenous people to meet Indigenous needs

Indigenous people must overcome significant inequalities and challenges every day, particularly in terms of accessing housing and succeeding at school. These obstacles often lead them to temporarily or permanently interrupt their studies before they obtain a diploma. Although First Nations members and Inuit theoretically have access to the same rental units as the non-Indigenous population, their specific needs are not met by most dwellings and they must overcome various additional difficulties stemming from prejudice and discrimination.

The SIRCAAQ's infrastructures establish conditions that are conducive to Indigenous students' academic success. This project has social, cultural and economic benefits. The living environment meets students' needs, values cultures and offers future generations a range of opportunities to help them develop to their full potential and participate in the region's socio-economic development.
